

How to use the Database

- 1. Open the ARHU Fellowship Database.
- 2. The ARHU Fellowship Database Spreadsheet will open:



Every row in the spreadsheet is a unique fellowship opportunity.


The columns across the top of the spreadsheet are labeled (from left to right):

- Opportunity Name The name of the Fellowship.
- Sponsor The organization/foundation/govt agency that is offering the scholarship opportunity.
- **Deadline (Known/Assumed)** The month the fellowship application is due. For applications between cycles, the most recently known deadline month is provided.
- Web Info This is a link to the Fellowship's website.
- **Brief** This is a brief (usually 1-2 pages) written by ARHU staff. You will find quick information about eligibility, deadlines, and sponsor goals in the brief. Clicking the link will bring you to a Google doc. (*More information on this below.*)
- Award Potential The most recently available information about potential award size/benefits.
- Education or University Employment Requirements Information about PhD, TTK requirements.
- Overarching Program Goals / Information Quick summary. We encourage you to read Briefs for deeper information and explore the Web Info for the most thorough account of the opportunity.


Using the Database: Example One

Scenario: I am a PI looking for a Fellowship related to my research on inequality.


- 1. I open the <u>ARHU Fellowship Database</u>.
- 2. When the spreadsheet shows up on my screen, I click **ctrl F** and a search box shows up on the right hand side of my screen. (Circled in red, below.)




3. In this search box, I type **inequality**. Google Sheets looks for this key word in the spreadsheet and guides me to the rows containing opportunities that align with this interest. I can see that the William T. Grant Scholars program is interested in research/projects related to inequality.




- 4. I'm excited to learn more about this opportunity. In the column called **Web Info**, I click on the **Link**. This brings me to the sponsor's website.
- 5. I'd like to see a quick summary for this fellowship, drafted by ARHU staff. In the column called **Brief**, I click on the word **Link**. This brings me to the Google Doc below.



6. I can see when this brief was Drafted and/or Updated by looking in the top right corner (circled in red). I can see that this was updated recently by mbs, Meghann Babo-Shroyer. I know I can reach out to her with questions about this opportunity and she is familiar with it.



7. I've decided that this opportunity looks like a great fit for my research and I want to download the brief to help me prepare to submit an application. I go to File - > Download - > Microsoft Word and save to my files for future reference.




7. I return to the Fellowship Opportunities spreadsheet to continue researching.

Using the Database: Example Two

Scenario: I am a PI who just heard that Professor Smith has applied for, and received, an Arthur Molella Distinguished Fellowship. I'm curious about this opportunity. Is this something I might want to apply for?

- 1. I open the Fellowship Opportunity Briefs.
- 2. When the folder opens, there is a list of Briefs for many (but not all) Fellowships that our faculty have applied to in recent years. Briefs are in alphabetical order. I find and click on the Arthur Molella Distinguished Fellowship brief.



3. I read the brief and realize this opportunity is a great fit for my work. I should apply next year! I save to my files using the method described above.
